INTRODUCTION

The data presented here are based on the results of the provincewide *Relance Survey of Vocational Training at the Secondary Level*, conducted annually by the Ministère de l'Éducation, du Loisir et du Sport (MELS). The survey carried out in 2007 concerns the graduating class of 2005-2006. The surveys carried out in 2006 and 2005 concerned the graduating classes of 2004-2005 and 2003-2004, respectively.

The purpose of this survey is to provide an accurate picture of the situation of graduates from secondary-level vocational training programs approximately nine months after they have earned a diploma. It meets a need for accurate, relevant information on how well recent graduates are faring on the labour market, just as the other two *Relance* surveys do in the case of college and university graduates.

HIGHLIGHTS

The **highlights** from the 2007 survey (describing the situation as of March 31, 2007) are as follows:

- The employment rate, calculated nearly nine months after students graduated, was 78.3 % for those who earned a Diploma of Vocational Studies (DVS), and 75.1 % for those who earned an Attestation of Vocational Specialization (AVS).
- The unemployment rate among DVS graduates decreased from 11.2 % in 2005 to 9.7 % in 2007, a drop of 1.5 percentage point. Among graduates with an AVS, the unemployment rate was 8.6 % in 2007, compared with 10.2 % in 2005.
- Among the graduates who were employed, 87.8 % were working full-time (30 or more hours per week) after receiving their DVS, while the corresponding rate for those with an AVS was 84.7 %. For DVS graduates, this rate has fluctuated little and has remained above 85.0 % since 2004.
- The percentage of DVS graduates working full-time was 94.3 % for men and 79.3 % for women. The corresponding percentage of AVS graduates working full-time was 92.4 % for men and 78.2 % for women.
- Among the DVS graduates with full-time jobs, 79.0 % said there was a link between their job and their training. The corresponding rate for those with an AVS was 71.1 %.
- Among DVS or AVS graduates, the average gross weekly salary of women working full-time was below that of men: \$490 compared with \$647 for DVS graduates, and \$529 compared with \$682 for AVS graduates.

GLOSSARY OF THE MAIN TERMS USED IN THE TABLES

TARGET GRADUATES

“Target graduates” refers to all holders of a Diploma of Vocational Studies (DVS) or an Attestation of Vocational Specialization (AVS) who graduated during the academic year preceding the survey year.

EMPLOYED

“Employed” refers to target graduates who stated they were self-employed or working for an employer, and not studying full-time.

SEEKING EMPLOYMENT

“Seeking employment” refers to target graduates who stated they were actively looking for a job and were neither studying nor working.

STUDYING

“Studying” refers to target graduates who stated they were either studying full-time or part-time, and not working.

INACTIVE

“Inactive” refers to target graduates who stated they were not employed, were not seeking employment, and were not studying.

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE (UNEMPLOYED)

“Unemployment rate (unemployed)” refers to the number of graduates seeking employment compared with the number of people in the labour force (which includes people who are employed and people who are seeking employment).

WORKING FULL-TIME

“Working full-time” refers to graduates working full-time, i.e. generally 30 hours or more per week.

WORKING PART-TIME

“Working part-time” refers to graduates working part-time, i.e. generally less than 30 hours per week. The proportion of graduates working part-time is obtained by subtracting the proportion of graduates working full-time from 100%.

AVERAGE GROSS WEEKLY SALARY

“Average gross weekly salary” represents the average gross income earned by workers for one week of full-time work. The data reflect only graduates working for an employer.

WORKING IN RELATED FIELD

“Working in related field” refers to graduates working full-time who consider their job to be connected to their field of study.

HOW INDICATORS ARE CALCULATED

The calculation table below uses data from the 2007 *Relance Survey of Vocational Training at the Secondary Level* to illustrate the application of the definitions of the main terms used in the tables.
