# INTRODUCTION

The data presented here are based on the results of the provincewide *Relance Survey of Vocational Training at the Secondary Level*, conducted annually by the Ministère de l'Éducation, du Loisir et du Sport (MELS). The survey carried out in 2011 concerns the graduating class of 2009-2010. The surveys carried out in 2010 and 2009 concerned the graduating classes of 2008-2009 and 2007-2008, respectively.

The purpose of this survey is to provide an accurate picture of the situation of graduates from secondary-level vocational training programs approximately nine months after they have earned a diploma. It meets a need for accurate, relevant information on how well recent graduates are faring on the labour market, just as the other two *Relance surveys* do in the case of college and university graduates.

# **HIGHLIGHTS**

Some **highlights** from the 2011 survey (describing the situation as of March 31, 2011):

- The 2011 survey indicates that, approximately nine months after graduating, the employment rate for individuals with a Diploma of Vocational Studies (DVS) was 77.4%, compared with 73.8% in 2010, an increase of 3.6 percentage points. The employment rate was 79.5% for graduates with an Attestation of Vocational Specialization (AVS).
- The unemployment rate for DVS graduates was 10.3% in 2011, the lowest rate in the past three years; in 2010 and 2009, it had reached 12.5% and 12.8%, respectively. For AVS graduates, the unemployment rate dropped from 9.5% in 2010 to 8.7% in 2011.
- Among those employed, 88.0% of DVS graduates and 86.7% of AVS graduates were working full-time (30 hours or more per week). For DVS graduates, there is a gap between the full-time employment rate for women and that for men; in 2011, this rate was 94.2% for men and 78.5% for women.
- In 2011, among the DVS graduates working full-time, 80.3% considered their job to be related to their field of study, compared with 76.7% in 2010. In 2011, the corresponding rate for AVS graduates was 78.9%.
- The average gross weekly salary for DVS graduates with a full-time job is on the rise. It was \$647 in 2010, compared with \$695 in 2011, an increase of 7.4%. For AVS graduates with full-time job, the average gross weekly salary was \$646 in 2010, compared with \$690 in 2011, an increase of 6.8%.

## **GLOSSARY OF THE MAIN TERMS USED IN THE TABLES**

#### **TARGET GRADUATES**

"Target graduates" refers to all holders of a Diploma of Vocational Studies (DVS) or an Attestation of Vocational Specialization (AVS) who graduated during the academic year preceding the survey year.

#### **EMPLOYED**

"Employed" refers to target graduates who stated they were self-employed or working for an employer, and not studying full-time.

#### **SEEKING EMPLOYMENT**

"Seeking employment" refers to target graduates who stated they were actively looking for a job and were neither studying nor working.

#### **STUDYING**

"Studying" refers to target graduates who stated they were either studying full-time or part-time, and not working.

#### **INACTIVE**

"Inactive" refers to target graduates who stated they were not employed, were not seeking employment, and were not studying.

## **UNEMPLOYMENT RATE (UNEMPLOYED)**

"Unemployment rate (unemployed)" refers to the number of graduates seeking employment compared with the number of people in the labour force (which includes people who are employed and people who are seeking employment).

#### **WORKING FULL-TIME**

"Working full-time" refers to graduates working full-time, i.e. generally 30 hours or more per week.

#### **WORKING PART-TIME**

"Working part-time" refers to graduates working part-time, i.e. generally less than 30 hours per week. The proportion of graduates working part-time is obtained by subtracting the proportion of graduates working full-time from 100%.

#### **AVERAGE GROSS WEEKLY SALARY**

"Average gross weekly salary" represents the average gross income earned by workers for one week of full-time work. The data reflect only graduates working for an employer.

#### **WORKING IN RELATED FIELD**

"Working in related field" refers to graduates working full-time who consider their job to be connected to their field of study.

# **HOW INDICATORS ARE CALCULATED**

The calculation table below uses data from the 2011 *Relance Survey of Vocational Training at the Secondary Level* to illustrate the application of the definitions of the main terms used in the tables.
