Two credits are assigned to each program.		
In Secondary II and III, the student continues in one of the two subjects selected in Secondary I (a four-credit program in Secondary II and a two-credit program in Secondary III).		
At the end of these three years, the student will have accumulated 200 hours, or eight credits, in at least one arts education subject. As a result, a student who so chooses will be able to continue his or her training in at least one of the arts education subjects.

These new rules must be applied starting the 2009-2010 school year when the first class of students graduates. Therefore, until 2009-2010, the current rules for certification of studies will apply and will continue to apply. Until that time, to obtain a Secondary School Diploma, students must accumulate 54 credits in Secondary IV and V, at least 20 of which must be at the Secondary V level or in vocational education.
