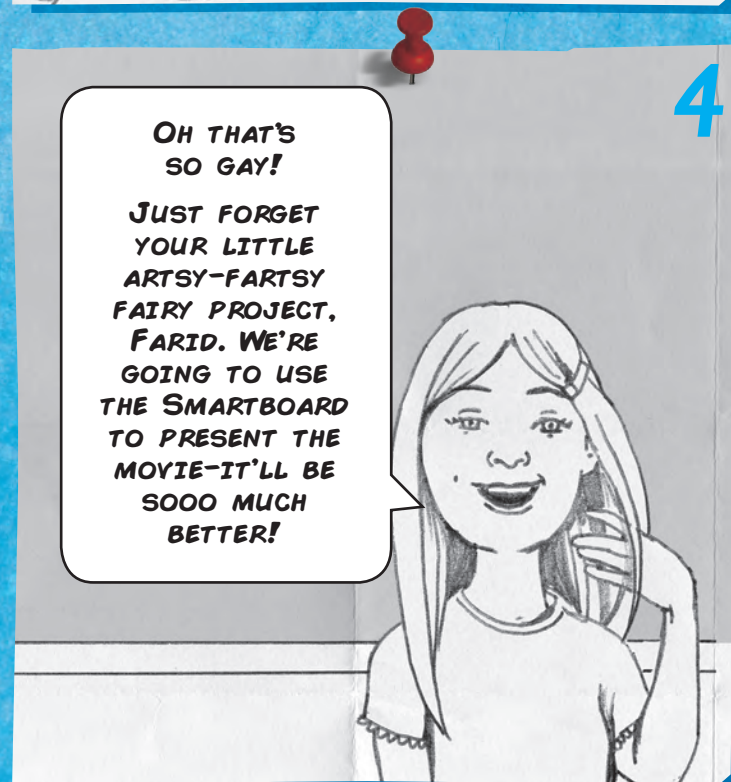
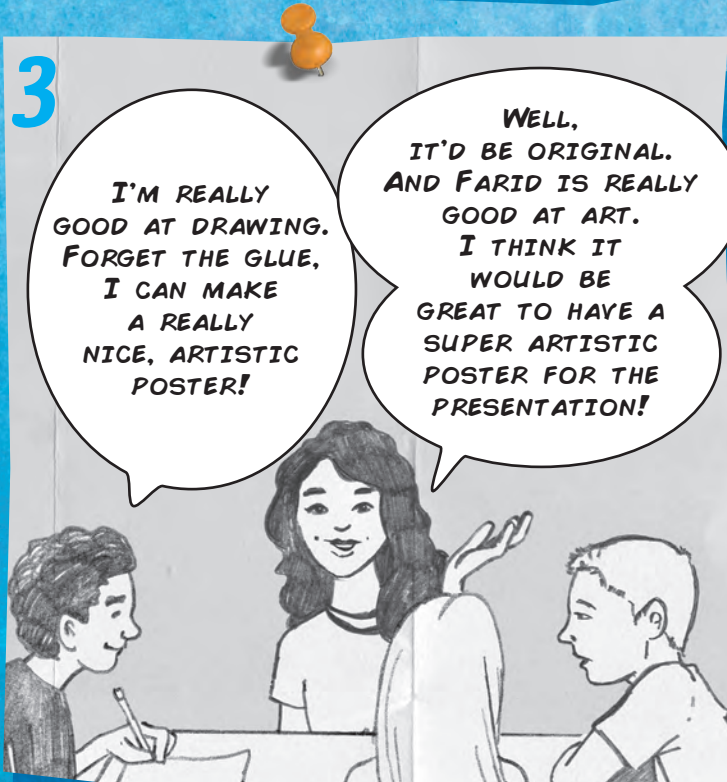
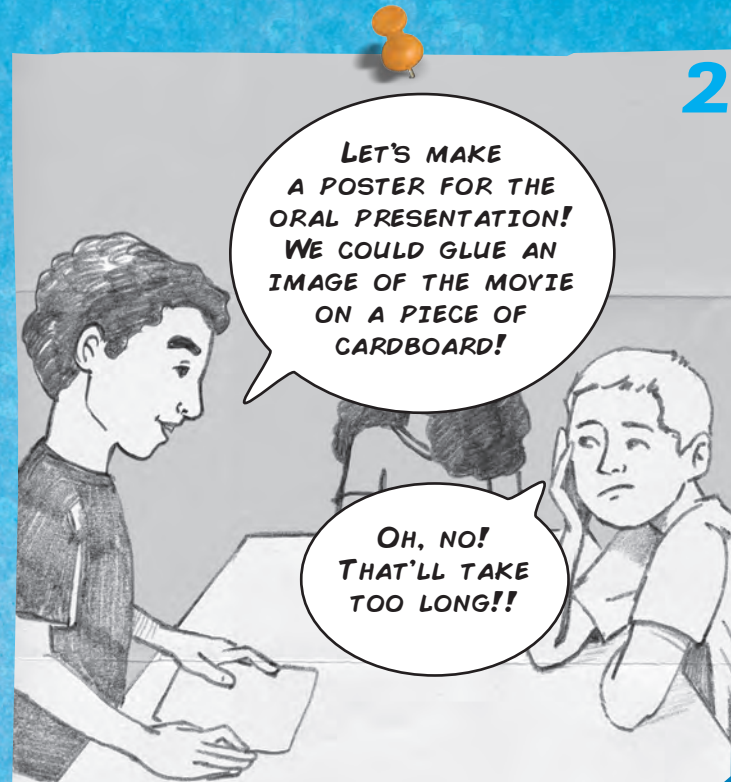


In Mr. Julian's Elementary 5 class, the students are divided into teams and are asked to do an oral presentation about a movie of their choice.
